Interim Organist & Choirmaster Report







past year was one of expected unexpected changes for the liturgical music ministries at CHT. At last year's annual meeting, we anticipated the completion of our organ project, and among the high points of the past year were the series of events with which we inaugurated the instrument. In September, our Bishop blessed the new organ at a special service of Choral Evensong followed by a tour of the instrument for donors and friends. We have highlighted the organ through two series of lunchtime recitals in Advent and Lent and at our weekly worship services. Other special events included recitals by students from the Curtis Institute and a concert of music for choir and two organs presented by Choral Arts Philadelphia. We look forward with anticipation to another special Evensong co-sponsored by the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Guild of Organists on April 2 and the dedicatory recital by Alan Morrison on April 12. Beyond public performances, the organ is used many hours each week by students at Curtis and beyond. The vision of the instrument as a resource for worship and community is being realized. I am thankful to all who have contributed in so many ways to bring this project to completion.

Music Report, cont.

In the area of unexpected transition, it has been my honor and privilege to once again assume leadership of music in worship following the departure of Donald Meineke in July. My goal over the past year has been to maintain the high standard of liturgical music established by my predecessors while continuing to adapt to the needs of the congregation. We continue to explore the riches of our Anglican tradition within our 21st century, American context. During Epiphany, we reintroduced congregational singing of the psalms using Anglican chant, which we will return to in the Easter season. We have also been making more use of the Episcopal Church's supplemental hymnals: Wonder, Love, and Praise; Lift Every Voice and Sing II; and Voices Found.

Our choir is an essential component of musical leadership for our worship, and I am grateful to the congregation and vestry for their continued support of a strong choral tradition at CHT. The choir sang at most Sunday liturgies, several services of Choral Evensong, and at the special liturgies of Holy Week, Easter, and Christmas. In addition to the special services associated with our organ, in February, the choir of St. Peter's Church joined us for our regular Evensong service. Choristers in 2024/2025 were Gail Caruso, Patricia Conrad, Stephanie DeMane, Will Dowling, Brian Felty, Franny Geller, Andrew Gutknecht, Alyson Harvey, Samuel Higgins, Kate Nicole Hoffman, Samual Keeler, Thomas Kneeland, Alex Mathews, Cole McIlquaham, John Miles, Titus Muzi, Mike O'Bryan, Aimee Pilgermeyer, Eddie Rubeiz, Erica Rose Smith, Julianna Smith, Amanda Staub, and Austin Stewart. Our choir is composed of highly skilled, committed, and engaged singers who are a joy to work with. I am deeply thankful for each one of them.

Dir. of Development & Communications Report

Dear Friends,

My journey as a CHRIT staff member has blossomed over the past few years. I started as the Rentals Manager in November 2023, took on the role of Director of Communications in June 2024, and at the start of 2025, have been given the blessed chance to serve our beloved community as the Director of Development & Communications.

In this new role, my mandate is to leverage our communications channels to increase our revenue. In order to do this, I have strengthened our visibility on our social media. I have created a more robust bank of pictures, videos, and audio from numerous CHRIT events to share on our Instagram and Facebook pages, as well as in our weekly enewsletter. Through the guidance of the Rectors, I have featured community partners, volunteers, neighbors, and parishioners that are contributing their time and skills to our church community (e.g. Sally Griffith's work with the Flower Committee, Kevin Hart of The Hart of Catering, Staff Demetrius Swinson's Operations Work, etc). This content serves a dual purpose: to educate those who are unfamiliar with our church about our religious programming and community ministries, and to engage our active community members through meaningful outreach and storytelling.

Working in collaboration with the Rectors and the Revenue Committee, I have understood our financial goals in the context of our Vivid Vision. We have prioritized grants as a source of revenue, and with guidance from the NonProfit Financial Fund, we will

file our nonprofit paperwork soon. Nonprofit status for Open Hearts Café will mean that Holy Trinity becomes eligible for several more grants, increasing our capacity to raise funds.

Along with grant-making, I continue to center our annual pledge/giving campaigns within our development plan, finding ways for active parishioners and Vestry members to inspire and invite individuals and families to make pledges toward the church. After attending the Pennsylvania Diocese's trainings on relational stewardship facilitated by Joseph D. Merlino (Emergent Mission), I am enthusiastic to work with the Revenue Committee Members to integrate more opportunities to form transformative relationships with parishioners and community members to cultivate stewardship.

We continue to utilize our platforms of Ministry Designs for our website and Constant Contact for our e-newsletter. Our fundraising information is on REALM, and I am exploring ways to systematize our donor database, as well as optimize our giving data to strategically create our development campaigns.

I have learned more about the religious practices of the Episcopal faith by creating the weekly bulletins for Sunday Service, with support from Rachel and Ben, and attending Adult Classes whenever possible.

I am undoubtedly blessed to be working with John, Karen, Robyn, Demetrius, Ben, Therese, and Kristin, as well as our Deacon-in-Training Robbin. And with Rachel, my dear friend, who made this a home for me, accepted me, and showed me the power of God's healing. Through and with you, I feel God more closely, and I am better person for it. I intend to reflect this love back to you.

Without hesitation, I know that God has placed me in this church community. I carry the weight of the work ahead of me, and I know I have much to contribute to our community. 




Open Hearts Café



One of our congregation's biggest points of connection with the community is the Open Hearts Café. Every Sunday and Tuesday evening, we invite up to 120 neighbors to come into our Centennial Room to enjoy an evening of good food, community, and music. During that time, we offer other services such as free clothing and haircuts. All of our guests live below the poverty line, and most are unhoused. This ministry is a direct extension of our Baptismal promises to strive for peace and justice, and to respect the dignity of every human being. The Open Hearts Café is run mostly by volunteers, and our volunteer corps is composed of CHT worshipers and members of the community at large.

We made several have **improvements** to our services over the past year. We switched from disposable plates to real **plates.** This allows our guests to feel like they are in a restaurant. By using real plates, we reduce our waste and carbon footprint. We have also expanded our seating capacity from 56 to 74. When we are able to remove more historical clutter from the space, we will be able to safely seat even more.







W/e also entered into amazing new partnership with Hart of Catering. Located at 21st and Sansom, Hart of Catering is a successful sandwich shop and catering business. The owners are heavily involved in the community, supporting people in recovery and people who need help re-entering the workforce. of Catering Hart has been providing half of our meals since January. Though the value of Hart of Catering's food is likely much higher, we estimate that this partnership is saving us more than \$40,000 this

year alone. We invite you to visit their café nearby for excellent food and atmosphere.



We are now in the third year of our Vivid Vision and I am grateful for what has become a new reality for CHT: we see growth in the number of people worshiping on Sundays, in a space with a completed organ, a repaired roof, and refreshed wood floors. Open Hearts continues to feed and clothe hundreds of our neighbors, and God

has provided, with numerous volunteers serving and businesses like Hart of Catering donating meals. Our Saturday clothing sales on the square cover some of the expenses while increasing our visibility and helping us connect with our neighborhood, which continues to be a critical part of our Vision.

We are mid race, despite miles behind us, we have more miles to go. One important skill in marathon running is learning to recover as you keep moving forward - taking liquids or gels, adjusting to a more comfortable pace, knowing a fast flat section is coming soon. This year our Church will go through an important sabbatical, a time for rest

Financial Report

The CHT Vivid Vision continues to drive the Finance Committee's focus on financial transparency and fiscal responsibility. We strive to ensure that the church's fiscal priorities are in line with the Vivid Vision's focus on greater engagement within the community and our long-term goal of serving our surrounding communities. We have tried to balance our desire to be fiscally conservative with the need to perform long-overdue deferred maintenance on our building

The Vestry completed the following achievements in 2024:

- 1. Continued to **develop an active and engaged Finance Committee**. The committee meets monthly and includes both Vestry Members and lay members.
- 2. Committed to **reducing the budgeted draw on the Endowment** to a maximum of 10%. This represents a continued decrease from previous years.
- 3. Evaluated the budget on a monthly basis to ensure that revenues and expenditures were in line with expectations.
- 4. Continued to **include church staff members in determining the budgets** for their areas of responsibility.
- 5. Expanded and developed the Revenue Committee's role in determining alternative sources of revenue (like grants, donations, and targeted requests). They also played a crucial role in leading an effective and well-run Stewardship Campaign.
- 6. In Q1 and Q2 of 2024, the Finance Committee **completed a deep dive of all budget categories** to ensure that they are in line with the church's mission and to trim costs where possible in 2024's budget.
- 7. Commenced the 2025 budgeting process in September 2024 to ensure that the budget was approved and in place by the start of the fiscal year.

For 2025, we would like to focus on the following deliverables:

- 1. Continue to find ways to **develop the alternative forms of revenue** by sourcing
 new grants, continuing to increase our
 rental income, and finding additional ways
 to reduce costs
- 2. Begin the process of **mounting a Capital Campaign** to address accessibility and the exterior masonry repairs needed within the next 3-5 years
- 3. **Attracting new members** to join both the Finance Committee and the Revenue Committee
- 4.Commit to **finding ways to reduce our reliance on the Endowment draw** in 2025 and 2026


The steps above will strengthen CHT's financial base so that we can continue to serve our community for many years to come, in a building that is safe and well cared for. 

Property Report

The Property Committee of the Church of the Holy Trinity met monthly to address issues of building maintenance and identifying and overseeing capital projects. The committee works closely with the church office staff, and welcomes Robyn Schnieders to the role of Dir. of Operations & Administration.

Although there were some smaller maintenance issues, the committee focused its work on the following projects:


Maintenance

A new railing was installed at the Walnut Street entrance to the Parish House. The railing on the ramp in the breezeway, which was in poor condition, was replaced. Problems with the glass front doors of the church were addressed.

Capital Projects

Roof

The roof replacement project, which took two full years to complete, was finished in November of 2024. The project experienced significant delays in the delivery of the skylight that is installed over the laylight in the church choir area. During this period, water infiltration caused damage to the plaster of the apse, which has become increasingly unsightly. In addition, a project accident resulted in minor damage to the church's Tiffany lay-light. The committee, with the assistance of an attorney and the church staff, is negotiating with the roofers regarding repair costs.



Painting

A painting contractor was retained to address the longneglected woodwork and railings of the church, and work was completed by the end of 2024. For budgetary reasons, one side (the north) was addressed this year; it is hoped that more can be done in subsequent years. We were able to include the three front doors and corner wooden sign in the project, giving a fresh appearance to the church exterior.

Planning

Accessibility

The committee continues to work to create a plan for physical accessibility at the church, and have looked at both short- and long-term solutions. We currently have a proposal from an architect to study possibilities and make recommendations which we hope to fund.





Space Allocation

The Transitions Committee of the Diocese has been in touch with the church regarding some ideas for more productively using the space the church currently has. A study is underway to determine what space the church needs for its own programming – now and in the future – so that we will be in a better position to address this request.



In addition, the committee worked with Bicycle Transit Systems (Indego Bikes) to have a bike station installed on the Walnut Street side of the church. Indego reports it is among the most used in the city. The committee looks forward to undertaking additional projects as funds become available.

The Committee is building their plan from The Episcopal Church's <u>Invite</u>, <u>Welcome</u>, and <u>Connect</u> model.

In 2025, the Parish Life Committee (Gail Caruso, Martha Lipscomb, and Nancy Rasmussen) will be folded into the Evangelism Committee to cover the range of Parish engagement, from inviting first-time visitors to engagement of members.

2024 Focus

In 2024, the committee was focused on building out the committee and developing an Evangelism strategy. Outcomes include:

- Developing and beginning to implement top priorities of welcoming, inviting, and connecting
- Completing a walk-through of the physical space of the church to make it more inviting and accessible
- Hosted the 2024 Pancake Supper (led by Parish Life)
- Started the birthday and celebrations blessings

2025 Goals

- Partner with the Property Committee to prioritize low- and nocost changes to make the space more inviting and accessible
- Improve signage and wayfinding through the sanctuary and Parish House
- Implement a full welcome process for new members
- Support Parish engagement during the Rectors' sabbatical

There are still several Sundays where we only have one usher, causing back up if anyone needs to enter via the breezeway and a scramble to find a second helper for the Offertory and Communion.


