

Choral Matins

Today we worship with a service of Morning Prayer - a type of service that has been used for millennia. The Jewish pattern of praying at sunrise formed the basis of the Christian monastic Daily Office, with its prayers or "hours" at seven times in each day. Thomas Cranmer's revision of the Daily Office for the first English Prayer Book (1549) reduced the number of services to two - one for morning (Matins) and one for evening (Evensong or Vespers). In the Second English Prayer Book (1552), the morning service was given its present name, Morning Prayer. Unlike Eucharistic services, the Daily Office can be led by those who are not ordained as priest.

Choral Matins is a service of Morning Prayer where the choir sings parts of the service on behalf of the congregation. Like Choral Evensong, Choral Matins has been practiced in cathedrals, collegiate chapels, and parish churches for over 450 years. Readings from the Old and New Testaments along with Psalms, Canticles, Hymns, and ancient prayers are woven together into a peaceful meditation as the choir and officiant exchange a sung dialogue of prayer.





Reader A reading from Paul's second letter to Timothy.

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. I am grateful to Godwhom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors didwhen I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do.

But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.





Vestry and Property Committee Member Simson Hui Encourages Us to Authentically Share Our Skills and Gifts to Serve Our Church

I want to share what giving my time and energy has meant for my relationship with God. I think a lot about authenticity, and I define that as being the whole me, whether I'm at home, at work, or at church. When I'm at home, am I living my faith as a husband and a father? At work, am I living my faith? In my job there're ethical choices I face, and is God happy with what my company's doing and how that's impacting the world as it is?

At church my question here is am I giving the skills I was given in helping this community? Being involved always starts with worship. When I'm here, I serve as an usher. I feel so joyful sometimes, having God's eyes to welcome someone who definitely needs to be here and is worshipping here. When I was serving on the Healing and Prayer Team, I get moved by the boldness to pray for something someone is struggling with or that someone they love is struggling with and that boldness inspires my faith. Being involved here is much bigger than being involved on Sundays. This is where that whole self, authenticity piece comes in.

My job involves dealing with developing and executing strategy and usually that's in three-to-five-year increments. One of the first things I did beyond Sundays, volunteering here, and giving a stewardship gift of my time and energy, was helping the church develop a five-year plan. Well COVID happened and we had to throw out the plan. Then John and Rachel directed us, as a vestry and rectors, to develop a three-year vision. That part about my faith has been really helpful, because I do plans all the time, but to do it in church and then sitting with our vestry and sitting with John and Rachel, it really taught me a lot more about prayer and having faith that God will provide. Together you see us becoming God's hands and God's hands do big things. Big things like replacing the roof here, like feeding Philadelphia. You do it one statement of work and one prayer at a time and that constant giving of time and energy is what makes these big things happen.

One thing Rachel always reminds me of is although we use our business skills to help this place, a church does not run like a business. We can't and shouldn't just power away through with money and context. We need to work prayerfully and with faith, and the term I'm using here is Jehovah-Jireh, God will provide. This stewardship season, I ask you to make your financial

gift as what you're willing to do and put that in the pledge, but also to give the gift of your hands beyond Sundays using the skills you've been given. I've been able to encounter God outside of church, in the work here of the church as well, and that's been a huge impact on my faith, but also being authentic in all aspects of my life. Thank you for your consideration.

Pledge Stewardship Campaign: Frequently Asked Questions

What is a pledge?

Simply put, a pledge is a promise to pay later. When you make a pledge, you are committing to making regular gifts in the coming year. Pledging allows you to think about what you are able to offer for 2026 and split up your gift into smaller, regular payments.

What's the difference between a pledge and a donation?

Pledges symbolize a commitment to give consistently to help support the costs, operations, facilities, and ministries of our church, while donations tend to be one-time offerings.

What's the benefit of pledging?

Pledging is critical in allowing our Vestry members, who are elected by the parishioners, to create a budget for the 2026 year. Your pledges help the Vestry members determine how we are going to allocate our resources to cover our expenses, which include everything from our basic bills (electricity, water, gas) and essential operational costs; our liturgy like Eucharist supplies, our choir and organ maintenance expenses; to our Open Hearts food and clothing ministries which serve nearly 500 guests per week. *Your pledges create the lifeline for our church to continue!*

What is the impact of pledging? How much have our pledge campaigns raised in the past? Our church expenses total nearly \$1.4 million per year. Our pledges cover about 15-20% of our operating expenses. In the past years our pledge campaigns have raised between \$185,000-\$200,000 and we have had about 50 pledgers. Parishioners give generously, and as they are able; pledges range from \$10 to \$3,000 a month. Of these, half of our monthly pledges are between \$50-\$450. Every gift, no matter how small or large, makes a difference!

Do I need to pledge monthly?

Many parishioners pledge monthly, and that is certainly an option. If you prefer a different pledging schedule, you can make your selection when you submit your pledge online.

Are my pledge payments made automatically?

No. In the new year, you can submit your pledge payments by setting up automatic payments through our online Giving Form, or mailing in a check.

What are other ways I can give?

You can give by making one-time donations online or via check, placing gifts in the offertory plate during service, supporting property projects and renovations directly, purchasing stocks as a gift to the Church, and leaving a bequest to Church of the Holy Trinity in your will.
